The draft Whistleblower Protection Law includes a requirement to ensure the existence of internal reporting channels in central and local public institutions, as well as in publicly-owned enterprises and private sector legal entities (enterprises, associations) with more than 50 employees. This norm derives from the Council of Europe and the OECD standards and recommendations and is also included in the laws of several other countries (Ireland, Netherlands, France, Australia, etc.). The panel discussion will focus on the development of such internal mechanisms that would provide workers with easily accessible and secure channels for reporting possible wrongdoings observed at the workplace, highlighting the benefits of such mechanisms for the organisation, be it a public body or an enterprise.

SESSION 3

This session will discuss the legal and institutional means necessary to effectively protect persons that suffer negative consequences because they raised concerns about possible wrongdoing at the workplace. The draft Whistleblower Protection Law sets out several protection measures: protection of confidentiality (anonymity); prohibition to create negative consequences; disciplinary responsibility in the public service; and the right to turn to the court or contest/appeal against the decision or action within the administrative procedure.

Experts from France and Ireland will share the experience of their countries. In Ireland, the Protected Disclosures Act came to force in 2014, providing a comprehensive framework for whistleblowing and guaranteeing state protection in the cases of both making a complaint to the Workplace Relations Commission and appeals to the Labour Court. In France, a new whistleblowing and whistleblower protection regulation was adopted last year ", and Latvia may learn from the first steps in its implementation. The panel discussion will focus on the existing measures and additional steps needed to ensure that the state provides efficient protection to whistleblowers in Latvia.
